Suspect Identified in Brookland-Bush Hill Robberies

Franconia District Officer Jim Reid will be discussing the robberies at the Tuesday, May 10, BBHCA community meeting.

A string of daytime robberies on Piedmont, Saratoga, Westchester, and Waycross have unnerved residents of Brookland-Bush Hill over the past several weeks. Suspicious cars to individuals on bicycles with backpacks have been reported. Typical stolen items appear to be laptop computers and jewelry.

One robbery had been reported by police on the Franconia District Station web site:

Woman Sexually Assaulted in Franconia

Franconia District Police Station—A woman was sexually assaulted on Tuesday, April 12, around 12:30 pm. The victim, a 62-year-old woman, was outside of a home in the area of **Waterlily Court and Valley View Drive** [the neighborhood opposite the Governmental Center/Franconia District Police Station] when a man grabbed her from behind. The suspect sexually assaulted her and fled.

The suspect's face was covered, but he was described as having a tan complexion with a medium build, wearing a brown polo-style shirt and black pants. The victim was transported to the hospital with non life-threatening injuries.

Addendum

In May 2005, then-President Sharada Gilkey presented Roy with the *BBHCA Volunteer Service Award*. The following text was published in the *BBHCA News* in acknowledgment of Roy's service.

"Roy Rice, his wife Doris, and their two children moved into their new house on Hopark Dr. in January 1969. Within one to two years he was attending meetings of the Brookland Civic Assn., the forerunner of our current Brookland Bush Hill Civic Assn. After the Association was broadened to include Bush Hill, Roy subsequently started attending meetings of the Lee District Land Use and Transportation Advisory Committee. Roy Rice has continued on this committee as his main civic activity for total service of over 25 years. This includes serving on various committees for Area Plan reviews, especially for the area around the Van Dorn Metro Station. However, he has also served on other advisory organization, e.g., on the Fairfax County Group Residential Facilities ('Homes') Commission for about 10 years, the Lee District Association of Civic Associations as a vice president, and on the South East Fairfax Development Corp. Board of Directors. Roy Rice also served our Association directly as an officer on the Executive Committee, and three years as President (reviving the organization after it closed down for a year or so for lack interest).

Eight Tips for Calling 9-1-1

- **Use 9-1-1 for emergencies only.** An emergency is any serious situation that requires the help of a police officer, firefighter or emergency medical provider right away. When in doubt, go ahead and call 9-1-1. The 9-1-1 call taker can determine if you need emergency assistance and get the appropriate help.

- **If you call 9-1-1-even by mistake-do not hang up the phone.** If you call by accident, stay on the line until you can tell the call taker that there is no emergency-so the call taker doesn't have to waste time calling you back or sending police with lights and sirens to check your address for an emergency.
- **Stay calm and help the call taker help you.** Call takers can't help you if they can't understand you. Take a deep breath and think before you talk. Speak slowly and clearly. Call takers are trained to get the most important information first so they can get help on the way. Answer all of the call taker's questions-no matter how irrelevant they may seem-before you hang up or leave the phone.
- **Determine the location of the emergency, if possible, before you call.** Knowing your location and providing the right address are vital for getting police, fire and EMS units to respond. For wireless 9-1-1 calls, sometimes the 9-1-1 call center that answers may not be the one that services the area you are calling from. Look for landmarks, signs at cross streets and distinctive buildings. Know the name of the city or county where you are.
- **Teach your children how to call 9-1-1.** Be sure they know what 9-1-1 is, can dial from your home and cell phone, and trust the 9-1-1 call taker. Make sure they are physically able to reach at least one phone in your home. When calling 9-1-1, your children need to know their name, parent's name, telephone number and especially their address. Tell them to answer all the call taker's questions and stay on the phone until they're told to hang up.
- **Prevent prank calls to 9-1-1.** Prank calls not only waste time; they are illegal in most states and endanger public safety. If 9-1-1 lines or call takers are busy with prank calls, someone with a real emergency may not be able to get the help they need. Be sure all members of your household are aware that prank or harassing calls to 9-1-1 will be dealt with by local law enforcement agencies.
- **Post your home address clearly and prominently.** Posting your 9-1-1 address at your driveway entrance and on your home will prevent confusion among emergency responders about your location. Try using something reflective or illuminated so that the address is visible at night. Do not assume that your mailbox clearly posts your address. Mailboxes are not always at the entrance of a driveway and usually are not marked clearly on both sides. Check with your local city or county for ordinances on posting 9-1-1 addresses, and always report missing street signs.
- **Know your phones.** Educate everyone in your home about the phone system in your home as well as how to use your cell phone.

Grill with Safety in Mind

As the grilling season begins, the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department wants to remind residents that grill fires cause an estimated average of 10 deaths, 100 injuries, and \$37 million in property loss each year nationwide, according to the U.S. Fire Administration.

Grills, hibachis, and barbeques on residential properties continue to be a high fire risk and, on average, result in more injuries and higher dollar losses when compared to all other fires.

It is crucial that each person diligently practice fire safety when cooking or grilling outside. Please review the safety tips below:

Grill Safety Tips

- **Keep grill at least 15 feet from your home,** building, or any combustibles and ensure adequate air circulation.
- **Check your equipment before each use.** Leaks or breaks of containers or pipes account for approximately 23 percent of all grill fires



on residential properties.

- **Charcoal must be kept dry.** Wet charcoal can spontaneously ignite. Spare propane bottles should be stored outside away from the home. A backyard shed is a good place.
- **Keep children and pets away from the grill.** Grills continue to give off heat long after cooking has stopped.
- **Never place hot ashes in paper or plastic bags or containers.** Only use metal containers for hot ashes.
- **Use Underwriters Laboratories (UL) approved electrical starters** in place of lighter fluid.

Homelessness Budget Out Scaled By Need

In just 14 months, more than 95 percent of the financial assistance available through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing (HPRP) program has been expended.

In October 2009, when the implementation of HPRP was being planned, the conversation centered on how to spread the word about available HPRP resources throughout the community. No one believed that in just 14 months we would be planning how to run the program with all of the financial assistance dollars spent. However, that is exactly where we are today. Efforts are now underway to cultivate new funding sources as the demand for assistance within our community continues to be great.

While this is a reason for concern, it also presents an opportunity to shift our focus from implementing HPRP to realizing HOST. Housing Opportunities Support Teams (HOST) provide flexible and adaptive services needed to help individuals and families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless to obtain or maintain housing in the Fairfax-Falls Church community.

Since the implementation of the **Fairfax-Falls Church 10-Year Plan**, homelessness has decreased more than 14 percent. Some of the key highlights from the past year include:

- The Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing program helped close to 900 people received the services and supports they needed to prevent or end their homelessness.
- Of the 3,076 people who were literally homeless, 482 were able to secure permanent housing.
- A Housing Options Committee was established to lead the community's efforts to create 2,650 new affordable housing units for persons who are literally homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Spring Rabies Door-to-Door Canvass Underway

Animal Control Officers will be conducting a rabies vaccination and dog licensing education campaign in several neighborhoods across Fairfax County this month. Police targeted neighborhoods where animals tested positive for the rabies virus in 2011 or late 2010. So far, eight animals have tested positive and a total of 23 since October 2010. Statewide, 63 animals have tested positive for rabies throughout the first two months of 2011 compared to 32 for the same timeframe in 2010. Officials typically are more concerned with rabies exposures in spring since there are more people (and pets) outdoors.

Rabies is a deadly virus that is transferred through the central nervous system tissue or saliva of an infected animal. Rabies vaccinations are mandatory in Fairfax County for all dogs and cats. The goal of the door-to-door campaign is to remind pet owners about the laws requiring all dogs and cats four months of age and older to be inoculated against rabies. All dogs four months of age and older must also have a dog license; failure to license

your dog or inoculate pets against rabies may result in fines of up to \$250. Residents should expect to see the roving officers beginning the weekend of March 26 through May 28.

Even if your pet is an “indoor” cat or dog, the threat of exposure to the rabies virus is real. Rabies is carried by wild animals that live in Fairfax County, including raccoons, foxes, skunks, bats, and others.

Traps Set Out to Track Spread of the Emerald Ash Borer



Glue traps will be hung in ash trees across Fairfax County to detect the emerald ash borer, an insect that kills these trees. The large, purple traps will help to monitor this pest’s presence in the county.

Officials ask the public to report traps that have fallen to the ground, and they advise not to touch them since they are covered with extremely sticky glue. Call the Fairfax County Forest Pest Branch at 703-324-5304, TTY 711, to report fallen traps or to permit traps to be put on private property.

Unless there is an infestation in an area already, the traps won’t bring the insect to locations where they are hung. Approximately 500 traps will be placed across the county as part of a statewide effort to track the insect.

County and state officials will monitor the traps regularly to check for emerald ash borers. The traps allow this pest to be found without damaging trees. Otherwise, arborists must cut away an ash tree’s bark to find the insects.

The triangular traps are non-toxic. They don’t contain pesticides or chemicals. To catch the insects, however, the traps are baited with natural plant oils and covered with non-toxic glue.

To date, this pest has been found in Arlington, Fairfax, Frederick, and Prince William counties. To prevent this pest from spreading to other parts of Virginia, state and federal quarantines ban the transport of firewood out of Northern Virginia. The quarantine covers: Fairfax County, Arlington County, Clark County, Fauquier County, Frederick County, Loudoun County, Prince William County, cities of Alexandria, Fairfax City, Falls Church, Manassas, Manassas Park, and Winchester.

However, firewood may be transported *within* the quarantined areas. When camping outside quarantined areas, use firewood from local sources, instead of transporting it.

Emerald ash borers have killed more than 25 million ash trees in the U.S. The borers are native to Asia, and they probably first arrived in this country in the 1990s.

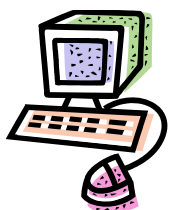
